


## One for the Road

For the last few weeks we have been busy packing up everything in our home, getting ready for our big move down to Orlando Florida, where we will be taking on our new role as executive director of operations. It's been a time of joy and grieving. The full sadness of leaving our home and all the fond family memories as well as the scores of lives we've touched was setting in. It comes in waves, alternating with the anticipation of the adventure what God has for us next, seeing God move in a different and significant way on a national scale.



As I begin talking with the 10 regional directors across the nation, I'm beginning to get a growing appreciation for what it takes to support all our missionaries in the field, what it takes to allow for Jen and I to do what we've been doing for the last 10 years. What was necessary for Jen to care for Heather, right now. There is a complex web of interconnected systems and services essential to running an organization of tens of thousands so that each missionary can stay on mission to share in God's passion for turning lost students and faculty into Christ-centered laborers. Email systems, financial services, medical insurance, risk management, creative media production, professional conferences, websites, mobile apps, and social media all come together to form a platform of services on which Jen and I have leveraged for the last 10 years for the Kingdom of God here at Amherst. "I think I really need God's help", Heather had written in her email. She was the friend of Lynn, one of our Epic student leaders who had been sharing the gospel with Heather all semester. And now Heather was uncertain about her future, she hadn't gotten a work visa yet, and if she doesn't by Friday, then she'll have to return to Hong Kong and forfeit her dream internship.

"Well, can we trust God, our Heavenly Father, who loves us to have the best job for us? Even if we don't know what it is yet?", asked Jen

"Yes.", replied Heather softly. And with that Jen explained the gospel to Heather one more time. The weeks of sowing by Lynn had softened the soil, and that night June 3, 2015, at the restaurant with the suspicious noodles, Heather invited Jesus into her life.

It was the sweetest ending to what had turned out to be a special day from the Lord for Jen. Two of Jen's alumni from Mount Holyoke College had come to help pack and reminisce. Sharing and recounting how the Lord has moved in their lives during and after college, it was a sweet time. It was extra special that the women were part of a chain of disciples, representing multiple spiritual generations, each generation laboring in the gospel to see the next generation come to Christ, the core of the Cru DNA to win, build and send.

At last, we arrived at our new home in this strange new land. Our pods arrived, a little rattled but mostly intact. And little by little, as we wade through the boxes and unpack their contents, our journey neared it's end. What has God got for us in this new season? I've spent this month meditating on God's goodness. Jesus asked the rich young ruler, "Why do you call me good? Only God is good." And indeed He alone is good. The more I think on this marvelous attribute of God's character, the more I am moved, and the more my heart is drawn to my savior.
