Taking San Juan de Dios for God

"I'd rather strike a match, than curse the dark" -Rend Collective

It felt like we were pushing back the darkness. The ghetto we were assigned to in San Jose was called "Saint John of God" in English. However, it was a place of despair: drugs, violence, witchcraft, and poverty were rampant. People did not trust their neighbors. A gang controlled the area and the government had no plan to intervene. But God...

We worked alongside a church on the edge of this ghetto. Pastor Cesar's wife Vanessa had been shot twice in the thigh while sitting in the church eating lunch six years ago while her kids looked on. Yet they continue to serve, leading Sunday services and feeding eighty neighborhood kids five days a week. They

are the real heroes. Their sons walked us from house to house as we shared the Gospel and set up water filters for families in desperate need of clean water and hope.

Our translators were from a second church in Costa Rica not far from the ghetto but, they admitted, "we would never have gone there without you." I have to laugh that God used our American brashness to bolster the faith and service of the Body in Costa Rica. Now their church is serving other teams with Filter of Hope, and Pastor Cesar is leading a Bible study with new believers in the ghetto, as well. Home at last, our mission team is praying for eyes to see the open doors in Maine, too.

It was a new day this past month when Keith and Craig led the father-son retreat and Dan just "helped"! We are so blessed to have competent new staff on our team. Shawna meanwhile has been creating brochures and overseeing the website to fill a huge need on our team.
