Who is the center of your affection? Yourself? Your spouse? If it is anything less than God you will eventually experience defeat, despair, indifference, and sin. This month we hosted a new secondlevel marriage conference for couples who had attended our "Journey to Oneness" retreat in the past. Using a tool Dan developed around putting on "the armor of light" (Romans 13:12,) we worked though faith vs. sin, love vs. indifference, and hope vs. despair as it applies to marriage and life. One spouse commented, "I didn't realize how far into isolation I had put myself." What a privilege to invite her into grace and truth and deeper relationship with her husband.

Love in Life

One activity that hit home involved carrying buckets of water with holes that represented the responsibilities in life. As couples lost water at different rates we addressed the stress of differing responsibility at home and how we tend to compare and set unrealistic expectations on our spouse. Participants were invited to refill their buckets at the spigot just as we must continually refill on the One who is our true Source of life. The important thing was not the race, but the water. Likewise, being filled with the Spirit and abiding in Christ is more important than worldly winning.

At another point, hiking up a mountain to sled down in the snow (representing despair vs. hope,) a wife pointed out a card from her last Thrive marriage retreat two years earlier. "I always keep it in my hiking backpack and look at it at the top of the mountain," she explained. Later, her husband added, "Being here and being honest about our marriage makes it seem more manageable." Praise God!

He hit a brick wall... Craig was describing one of the men on last weekend's Katahdin hike. The winter ascent in high winds with a wind chill of -40° was a brutal trial. "The Lord is your fortress! We are going to get there together," Craig encouraged the flagging hiker. Craig admits that he himself was ready to call it quits. But, he recounted, they both put one foot in front of the other and the Lord carried them forward.

That was our new Thrive staff man, Craig's, account of his experience. Others agreed that the theme of "Contentment in the Lord" kept them surging forward and gave them much to consider in their everyday lives. Dan led a group of nine men to summit the mile high Mount Katahdin, Maine's highest peak. Despite having every surface covered, he has some frost bite on his cheek bones, souvenirs of the ascent.
