




JUNE/JULY 2020

Jen has been really open and curious to learn more about Christianity and the Bible, but she's also consistently expressed a difficulty finding or having "a personal faith".

So this semester, we've been going through a Bible study together, geared towards nonbelievers that seeks to answer the questions "Who is Jesus?"

Each study uses stories from the gospels to illuminate an attribute or role of Jesus (i.e... "Jesus the teacher", "Jesus the redeemer," "Jesus the life-giver" etc.).

I was nervous Jen wouldn't be interested in our studies anymore once students were no longer on campus and we'd have to start meeting online, but I was pleasantly surprised by her enthusiasm to continue reading through Luke, even if that meant doing so virtually!

The first week we met over FaceTime, the topic was "Jesus the Healer" and Jen's immediate comment was "you know it's a little ironic that this is the topic in the middle of a pandemic" - so true! I hadn't put that together, but it was a good reminder for me that God is in control even when the world feels wildly out-of-control.

Every week was so refreshing getting to talk with Jen about who Jesus is; it consistently felt like a reorientation towards God and his goodness. And Jen must have felt similarly because a few weeks in to our virtual meet-ups, she sent me a text that said, "Hey Emily, I just wanted to say a quick thank you for taking some time out of your week for us to 'meet' it really helps add some stability to my day even though the world has turned itself upside down right now."

I really don't think it was me that was adding stability and peace to Jen's life; I think it was God's faithful pursuit and gracious love found in the pages of Scripture and the person of Jesus. Join me in praying that as Jen continues to encounter this love, that she would finally discover the faith she's been longing for.

Amen, Emily! We pray that you, too would experience the stability and peace Jesus offers us, even as we continue to live in such unusual circumstances. I personally believe that this is an unprecedented moment in history that open doors previously locked tight to allow us even greater effectiveness in evangelism! Clay and I are both as excited as we are apprehensive, and we hope you'll join us in praying for God to use us in unique ways this coming school year.
