"Jesus was just a great spiritual leader."

"I don't really know what God is like."

"I think to get into heaven, you just have to be a good person."

These phrases rose above the din of the noisy student center and crowded academic buildings and pierced my (Clay's) heart.

All of these quotes\* were taken from students I spoke with two weeks ago as a part of our "Perspectives" Outreach. During this week long outreach, Cru staff and students set up big posters all around campus emblazoned with colorful words and pictures that asked questions like "What is God like?" and "What is the meaning and purpose of life?"

The goal of the outreach was to open up dialogue with students who might not otherwise want to engage with Christianity, and hopefully give an opening to share the Gospel with them in a way they could understand. Students engage with the outreach out-



side of the OU Student Center.

It was through this outreach that I met Jake\*. Jake stood before me, arms crossed, thinking hard as we spoke.

Jake had grown up in the church, but really struggled with the idea of hell. "Let's say you have a son," he said. "If your son rejected a relationship with you, you wouldn't torture him or send him to some terrible place of punishment, right?"

"Actually, I do have a son. A five month old that I love very much. But say in twenty years, he decides he doesn't want a relationship with me and leaves my home, I can't stop him. At that point, he has chosen the broken rela-

tionship and all of it's consequences. Our relationship with God is similar. He won't stop us from choosing to reject Him. Hell is a place away from God and His goodness. He's not sending people there because He wants to punish them. He's just letting them have what they've asked for."

Jake didn't walk away convinced to follow Christ, but he did say he had a lot to think about. He, like many students, expressed appreciation for the chance to be heard and have their questions answered.

"I've never heard all of this presented like this before. It makes a lot of sense."

"This is really interesting. We have different views, but I totally see the line of thought about what you believe."

Thank you for being with us as we labor to help students like Jake hear and understand the Gospel. Please continue to pray for them, especially

the handful of students who have continued to meet with our staff and students to continue learning more about Jesus.
