Guy's Ministry Update

The new year is beginning and with the new year Guy will be transitioning to a new major project. Over the last several years he has mostly worked on studio renovations and has helped to set up small local FM stations. During the next 18 months we will all be spending a lot of time in the Philippines assisting in upgrading FEBC's international short wave ministry there. Guy has been assigned as the project manager for the Iba Renovation Project in Iba, Philippines. will mean taking up temporary residence in the Philippines and "commuting" from there to support projects for other FEBC fields. We will be keeping our Indonesian visas and our house in Lippo Karawaci since this is a temporary assignment.

In the next few weeks Guy has a trip to make to Singapore for short wave planning meetings and has a lot of loose ends to tie up in Indonesia before we will be ready for our upcoming two month trip to the Philippines.

Iba Renovation Project

The Iba Renovation project will stretch over at least 18 months. This year we will be working to retire FEBC's last antique transmitter. In the process we will also renovate the Iba Transmitter building. There is a lot to do: a new roof, a new power substation, and a much newer transmitter which is to be relocated from our Saipan facility. The project engineering design work and planning is well under way. Guy hopes to get the project office set up and the bidding activity started for outdoor work right away in February. The outside construction work needs to be under way by March at the latest so that it can be finished before the rains come in June.

Iba is about four hours north of Manila. It is also very rural, so everyone will get the chance to experience "living in the province."
