## Erika: A Changed Life

In middle and high school, I (Erika) just wanted to be loved. I thought that if I was a good student and person I could earn the approval and affection of my family and peers. I thought the more I did, the more affection I would receive. I was extremely self-critical and constantly frustrated when I couldn't figure out why I didn't feel like I was enough. I thought that I would only be accepted when I was acceptable to everyone. So, coming into college, I felt exhausted and desperately alone.

In my first week as a freshman at UW-Madison, I ended up running into an old friend from middle school. She was a Christian, and she invited me to join a Cru Bible study with her in our hall. Initially, I joined because I figured I could make friends within the study, but I eventually found a joy far greater. My friend only stayed at Madison for a semester, but I stayed in the Bible study for the whole year.

Over the course of my freshman year, I felt God pursuing my heart like crazy. But I still wrestled with not understanding what it meant to be adopted as a child of God. Growing up, I had a distant relationship with my dad, so understanding the covenant love of our Heavenly Father was something I wrestled with.



Second semester my freshman year, I finally understood God's covenant love through reading Hosea. There is nothing I can do to earn God's love; it's by grace, a completely undeserved gift, that He loves me and desires to have a personal relationship with me. I surrendered my life to Him that night.

Since then, I've realized that godliness is grown based on my own obedience and submission of the Lord's will over my life, not doing things to earn His love and favor. It is a daily dying to myself. I've weighed the cost, and I rest in the promise of knowing that Christ is and will always be worth it. In Him, I've found new life and joy like I've never experienced.

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
