

my entire testimony with her. She listened wide-eyed and very eagerly received what I had to say about Jesus. God gave me the chance to ask her if she'd want Him in her life but she said "Japanese people don't think much about God." She wanted more time to think and read the Bible to understand more about Jesus before she could decide. I told her I'd be praying for her and just walked away thankful but also burdened. I praise God for the way I got to speak into Chinami's life but her words hit me hard.

Japanese people really don't think about God. People in general do not but in Japan, since less than 1% claim they are Christian. They don't even have the chance to hear the gospel. People say it takes a person 6 times to hear the gospel before you can understand and accept Christ. How long would it take an average Japanese person though to hear the gospel even once?

I don't know what it is but God keeps placing Japan heavily on my heart. I am praying about going back and actually started to take Japanese language classes at an adult school nearby. Please pray for me to develop my language skills so that I can effectively minister any time God sends me to Japan! I pray that it is often!

was a slow one! I was jetlagged for what seemed like a month! But the 1st day of classes came quickly. This is my first year officially serving as the co-director of Hawaii with Kent. As daunting as it may seem to be trying to spread the gospel to 50,000+ university students in the entire state with one other person, I feel eager to jump into this role.

It's clear that God wants me here in Hawaii. I don't know how long He'll call me here but I'm committed to finishing strong how ever long it may be. A few different obstacles this year will be the size of

our team. We have gone back to 2 staff since our interns were just here for one year. We have a staff couple (below) raising support to come join us soon and we pray that more staff will be sent our way. Another thing is that I am not working with the 3 peers (our 3 interns) like I did last year. I think that's been hard not having people my age to work with. It is difficult being the only 28 year old reaching out to 18 year olds in the dorms. But God is humbling me daily & giving me strength. I ask that you come alongside me and pray for my life & our students as well.

I look forward to keeping in touch with you all. THANK YOU for how you have been here with me throughout my first 3 years here....maybe my next 3 years are starting now? Blessings to you all—please let me know how you are & note my new address below!
