Korean Festival (6.15). My church hosted this outreach event, which included taekwondo and a traditional fan dance. Most of the performers were either short-term missionaries or Korean exchange students from our ministry.

Everyone worked really hard, and I was so encouraged to see them using their culture and talents to share the gospel. God honored their efforts; close to *200 people* came, and 30 of them indicated that they had trusted Christ through the program! Hallelujah!

Afterwards, he spent some time talking and praying with another missionary before asking me for a transcript. It felt great knowing God used me to speak to him.

Summer Missions (-7.29)Throughout June and July, we're blessed to have many short-term teams from the US and Korea join us in ministry. Their energy is always welcome at a time when we're tiring as we approach the end of the semester.

These teams minister alongside us on existing campuses and also help to pioneer new ones. As I was writing this, I heard that a couple of students on a new campus trusted Christ today! Hopefully these two will get connected with us so they can keep growing after the teams leave. Lord willing, they may even be used to launch a new ministry on their own campus in the future!
