

"I love it, I love it and I don't know what to do!", sobbed William (name changed). Through tears, he confessed his slavery to multiple daily substance addictions. Around him a group of over 30 young men, listened and nodded. It was Saturday evening at our fall retreat.



"So what I'm hearing you say is that you no longer want to get high, no longer want to run to getting high for comfort and acceptance, but you are turning 180 degrees and placing your trust in Jesus", guided Tim. William nodded through streams of tears. It was important for William to understand what he was doing. This was repentance.

William, a second year engineering student, has helped lead worship at times, attended a Christian high school and was a honor college student at UMass. But he was leading a double life, and it was eating him up from the inside.

This year our theme for the fall retreat was "going deeper, growing roots". Cru at the University of New Hampshire had been for the past several years experiencing a spiritual awakening of sorts. Students at UNH would regularly

repent publicly of their sexual sins, their fake lives, their addictions, and more. One by one they were prayed for and many have experienced healing and restoration, over time. Seekers are invited into this community of extraordinary transparency as they also witness the Spirit of God heal and restore, through the body. And as they witness the body and the Spirit, they too are transformed. Reports from their community read like the book of Acts. And indeed God does add to their number.

At UMass, we wanted our students to experience the Spirit in a deep, fresh way, and it all happened Saturday night. After a day of teaching and meditating on the greatness of God, the sinfulness of man, and work of the cross, hearts were finally prepared. We had spent months praying for the Holy Spirit to work miraculously.

One by one, around the circle, students confessed and repented, of sexual sins, pride, drunkeness and drug addictions. Split between men and women, almost every student brought things into the light and were prayed for and set free.



It's been a month since, and William is doing great. "I've never felt more free", he shared over coffee. He's been involved with "The Experiment" in the honors dorms and meeting daily with others to discuss scripture and make God known.







For 21 days in November, 369+ Cru and Epic students from UMass Amherst, including friends, professors and colleagues, are reading through the Book of John to put an end to the atrocities of sex trafficking.
