- Line-up Resources.

Live out the Missional Objectives

Living missionally is trusting God for the impossible. We know that hearts change as the Holy Spirit moves. Not only are we praying for the changed hearts of students, but of administrators and professors. In the next few years we are trusting God for some pretty big things.

Spiritual Movements

In the past 6 years, we've seen a shift in how God is growing our ministry. Not only has God opened up new campuses to us, but with AIA and Epic, we are seeing new student populations open up that would not have been reached as effectively with a traditional Cru movement. We are excited to advance in this direction as the Lord leads.

One of our main goals in this upcoming year is to continue in launching Destino, our Latin American ministry. We are praying for the Lord to raise up a core group of student leader, who will have a passion for seeing the Lord reach the whole campus through Latin American students who are Christ followers.

We are also looking to see Epic more firmly established at Smith College, Amherst College and Mount Holyoke College. While we have movements active at these campuses, we have not been able to get official recognition through either the religious affairs or student government.

There are several distance campus movements (Greenfield Community College, Massachusetts College of Liberal Arts and Westfield State University, Fitchburg State) that we have pioneered, but are not as yet thriving. We hope to better resource these campuses so that students can experience a vibrant spiritual movement that passionately embrace the gospel and the great commission.

Lastly, there are new pockets of students that our student leaders or staff are experiencing some openness. They are the greek system (Fraternities and Sororities) and the Jewish student community. Last year Jeff Chan and Jenny pursued relationships with students who are involved with the Asian greek houses($\Pi \Delta \Psi, K \Phi \Lambda$). We are closer to launching an Asian greek movement. This past May, Jeff L., a student leader from Cru began a bible study with one of the Frats (ΔY). Establishing a foothold among the greek houses would be incredibly strategic for the gospel here at UMass. Secondly, Larry the director of Religious Affairs at UMass has asked Epic would be interested in doing someting like Habitats for Humanities with Hillel (a reformed Jewish organization). Many students involved with Hillel are apparently not interested in spiritual matters, and Larry wanted to see if another ethnic spiritual group might be a good platform for spurring them on interest in their spiritual heritage. What a great opportunity for our students to share their spiritual journey as Asian American Christians!

Student Leaders & "100% sent"

I've often explained to students that they come to college with an expectation that they would grow intellectually and academically. How disappointed (even angry) would they be if they didn't grow? If they didn't learn anything? If they weren't ready for some occupation or further study? All that time and effort invested with no return. I know I would feel betrayed, disappointed and angry. And yet students often have no such expectations when it comes to their spiritual life. The truth is college is an incredible opportunity to grow spiritually. It is a crucial time to invest 4 years, stepping out in faith to experience God's transforming grace and truth. A time for getting equipped to become a passionate and productive members of the body of Christ. Like many who have a vision for their careers or academic studies at the beginning of their college years, followers of Jesus need to come to college having a vision for their spiritual growth, expecting to be laborers committed to the Kingdom at the end of their journey.

Our model for equipping and raising leaders in our movements has been personal discipleship. As effective and

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rewarding as this labor has been, we want to see <u>every</u> student sent into all walks of life passionately pursuing God's purpose for them in their intended career field. Our desire is that every student would see themselves as missionaries in corporate America, medicine, law, accounting, engineering in Asia, journalism in the Middle East, or science, etc. We are asking God for wisdom for ways we can improve so that the number and quality of students would grow whose feet are ready with the good news when they graduate.

Line-up Resources

As our team pursues the entire scope of Western Massachusetts requires human, financial, intellectual, and technological resources. While Jen and I have developed a team of ministry partners who regularly pray and give to our personal ministry, the needs of our missional team are quite different. We are starting to build a vibrant ecosystem of churches, volunteers, alumni, students and staff who will resource the mission here.

Build Alumni base

Cru has been at UMass since the early 1970's. Currently we have a very small alumni base for prayer, finances and mentorship. Part of helping students live missionally after they graduate is having a network of alumni and churches that will help graduates plug into churches and ministries focused on living and proclaiming the gospel.

Connecting the dots

We believe that God has placed His people in various positions on our campuses. Whether they are students, adminstrators, local church members with a heart for the campus, they can be connected to God's awesome plans to reach the lost.

As we take on this new role, the journey is just beginning to proclaim the coming of the Kingdom of God. We whole-heartedly covet your prayer as we wrestle with our new role. We want to walk in faith and love, leading from an overflow of the Holy Spirit.

Prayer retreat

In 1806, Samuel J. Mills entered the all-male Williams College at the age of 23. Like many colleges in the 1790's, the spiritual and moral conditions at the school were tough for Christians. Believers were often ridiculed and ostracized from the social life of the campus. The French Revolution and Enlightenment ideals ushered in a wave of skepticism towards God and the Bible. Alcohol flowed freely on the campuses and wild parties were common. Several church-based colleges completely lost their theological moorings.

One pastor wrote, "It seemed as if God had almost entirely withdrawn His gracious influence. We were left to mourn an absent God, barren ordinances, an unsuccessful Gospel and cold hearts."

But it doesn't end there. Samuel along with 4 other students would pray for God to change their campus and their nation. And God would answer that prayer! 6 years later because of those prayers the very first missionaries would set sail from America to bring the good news of Jesus Christ to foreign lands.
