TAKIN' IT TO THE DORMS

Former campus director Pete Baglow (and Betsy Baglow) has been here at UMass since the early 1990's. "In all our time here we've never seen anything significant happen in Southwest... until now.", said Pete. By significant he is referring to a community of believers (students) whose expressed purpose is to reach out to the lost. Southwest is the crowded dorm area where over 4000 students live, many of whom are athletes. It's known for its parties and for the student riots that have become a tradition. Last year alone the students caused over \$100,000.00 of damage when a riot

broke out after UMass lost the football championship. However, in the past semester, both the men's and women's small groups in Southwest are beginning to get some traction, under the leadership of Pete and Betsy. It's exciting to see what God is doing and we can't wait so see more.

Here's just one story. Betsy encouraged Nicole (one of our students who live in South-

west) to invite her roommate, Danielle, to the women's small group. Danielle seemed excited and attended for a number of weeks, even inviting others to come and join. Betsy and Nicole then proceeded to share



the gospel with Danielle, but afterwards, she seemed to lose interest. Then a couple of days after expressing her lack of interest, she was in her room lying on her bed and her poster which hung over her bed fell on her. Over and over again, she would put the poster back up. And over and over, it would fall on her again. Then one time, as she picked up the poster, she realized something. The large poster had just one word on it. It read, "**Believe**." As Danielle relayed the



story back to Betsy, she confessed excitedly, "I get it now, it's like God was saying to me, just believe!"

Please pray for the small groups in Southwest, that they will thrive and grow and be a light for all to see, pointing all to Christ.

In the north end of campus, where Jen and I spend most of our time, we are also seeing things to get excited about. First, Eli and Jonathan (Remmers) have accepted the challenge to help lead the men's small

> group. This is a significant step of faith for them, so please pray for them. Also, we are challenging our students to integrate the sharing of the gospel as a regular part of our small group communities in the North campus. So far, we are planning to go regularly to do follow up of the Spring semester surveys (please pray that there will be a great response), having a social event once a month

to invite our non-Christian friends to, and ministering regularly to the homeless on the streets of Springfield and calling non-Christians to join us as we go and share God's love.



After hearing from Shane Deike at the Boston Winter Conference about reaching out into other oikos (or groups) on campus, the women of North campus are praying about whether to reach out to the students on the "2-in-20" dorm (the gay/bisexual/lesbian/transgender dorm program) by serving them in practical ways on a regular basis. Please pray for God to give them wisdom, boldness and faith.

It was the third time I asked Jack, and for a third time during our brief conversation, Jack answered, "Yes."

I couldn't believe it. We had gathered that Friday afternoon to follow up on the last of the surveys that we had from the beginning of the semester. Finals were almost here, and with me was Stephen Ta, one of the students who are committed to launching Epic (the Asian American focused ministry of Campus Crusade) at UMass this Spring semester. I remember sharing with Stephen, that over 90% of Asian Americans were unreached. He looked at me thoughtfully, nodded and replied. "I know that God has called me to reach the Asian community here at UMass. My dorm is mostly an Asian dorm, and on every floor there is at least one person who used to come to my church. Whether they knew the Lord or not, they're not walking with Him now. Last year I noticed them, but now I know that God's put me here at UMass to reach them." It was the first time Stephen had come with me to



share the gospel. As I talked with Jack, he watched and listened. And when we prayed with Jack to receive Christ, it was just another confirmation for Stephen that the Lord has called him. Before we left for the winter break, Stephen wrote me to tell me how much he was looking forward to the upcoming semester and the start of Epic.
