"Just a thought.", I allowed. We were at the Veritas Forum at UMass, the highlight event for a week long apologetics outreach sponsored by Cru and other Christian groups during passion week. Each day two lunch time topics were addressed over a meal. Topics ranged from the reliability of the Bible to gender issues from a Christian perspectives. And each evening there was a more substantial forum.

It was after the question and answer time, and the student union ballroom was abuzz with conversations. Over 200 students, staff and faculty were in attendance and Dr. Zoeller, a world expert in thyroid hormones, had just presented at the Veritas Forum representing the atheist perspective.

"Well can I ask you this?", I continued, "What would you consider the top evidence for you, as a scientist, against the resurrection of Jesus Christ?" His opponent Dr. Ian Hutchinson from MIT had just offered the Christian perspective on science and faith, and on the resurrection of Jesus Christ.

"I can't, I don't have any. I'm familiar with the evidence,

but I can't commit [to the resurrection], neither can I dismiss it out of hand", he admitted.



"Thank you for your time", I replied, as we allowed the next person in line to approach Professor Zoeller. With me was, Soun, a biochemistry student, who has been investigating the Christian faith for over a year now. We had just asked both professors about the evidence for and against the resurrection, and the forum itself was on the topic of Faith and Science.

"So what did you think?", I asked Soun.

"I think I agree with Professor Hutchinson.", replied Soun. As Soun and I talked more over the next couple of days, it was clear that the Lord was continuing to work in Soun's heart. Please pray also for Professor Zoeller and the openness of his heart. It was clear from my conversation with him, that he was very disappointed with the Catholic Church over the child abuse scandals. But, the door is open for us to continue our conversations over faith, science and morality.

We talked on and on about their experiences, past traumas, and hopes for the future. It ended up being about a two hour long conversation. After they explained

their thoughts on everything, we shared our personal beliefs. We went through the Knowing God Personally booklet with them. We explained how God loves everyone, unconditionally. And how our own sinful nature keeps us from Him.

When we pointed to two diagrams, one showing Christ in the center of our lives and the other showing ourselves on a pedestal, we asked them which one best represented their lives. They all said the self-centered one. When we asked them which they wished their lives could be, they all excitedly pointed to the one where Christ was the center of their identity.

They said the longed to know him on a personal level. Sam and I were of course psyched, so we showed them a prayer they could pray that would represent their change of heart. After reading it over on their own, they said it was a commitment they were ready to make. Together we all held hands and said the prayer. We were all so filled with joy and gave hugs, took prayer requests, and promised that we'd pray for each other.
