## ECAASU 2011 by Joe Chau



o, I've never heard my father's say that he loves me", remarked Charlotte (name changed), an Asian American student from New York City. I was conducting an Asian American spiritual survey from Epic Movement (www.epicmovement.com), the Asian American Ministry of Campus Crusade for Christ. The survey is designed to engage, Asian American students on spiritual matters. "But you can't really expect that from Asian fathers.", she concluded, the others students in the group nodded in agreement. What an honor it was to tell them about their Heavenly Father's love for them!



Over the course of ECAASU (the 2 day Asian American Student conference) dozens of Epic students from UMass/Smith College/Mt Holyoke/Amherst College engaged in spiritual conversations with scores (maybe even hundreds) of students from all over the east coast, at the information table, in the dinning halls, between sessions, and at the fortune cookie dinner. Attendees were surprisingly open to discussing spiritual things.

When asked about their concept of God, we found that almost all of the Asian American students believed very deeply in the supernatural. They may not recognize that Jesus is God. Many didn't even recognize the Judeo-Christian God, but the supernatural was very real for almost all the students we surveyed. In contrast, when I speak with students from a western cultural background, they often harbor significant doubts as to the existence of the supernatural.

Another thing that we found was that many of the students we spoke with had some kind of history with the church. They were invited to youth group or they had been invited to retreats in highschool, but had not encountered a college ministry to answer the many questions they had about the Christian faith in an culturally relevant way. The spiritual journeys of the students we talked with ranged from those who had at one time considered themselves Christians, to students who have decided that the Christian faith was unintelligible and could not be the right way. Charlotte, for example, who is best friends with the president of "Seekers" (a highschool Christian ministry in New York City) at Stuyvesant Highschool, had genuine questions about Jesus (both spiritual and intellectual) that she could not find adequate answers to from anyone on her campus.

Looking at our info table, where crowds of students flocked, even the organizers of the conference, (who had no interest in making spiritual matters a part of the discussion on the Asian American experience) had to acknowledge that perhaps there was something missing from their agenda.

We are so encouraged by our experience at ECAASU. And we know that it is just the first step for Epic Movement (both at UMass and nationally) to more intentionally and broadly engage the Asian American student community with the much needed message of Jesus Christ.
