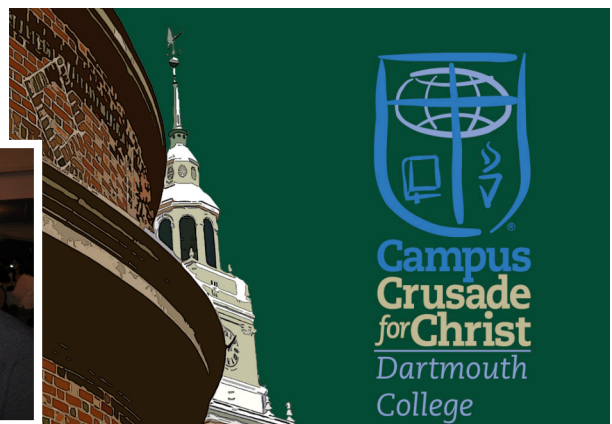

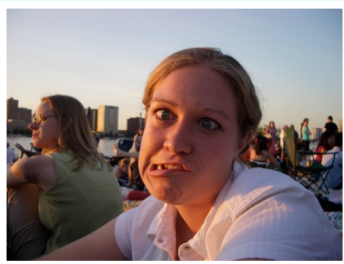

Kim got involved with Campus Crusade here during her freshman year and will be graduating this June. She is headed off to be a missionary in Turkey (the country with the least access to Christianity in the whole world) with Mission to Unreached Peoples. She will be joining a team of others (including her parents) who are trying to find ways to reach every segment of society in Turkey with the gospel. Kim will be attending medical school there in order to be trained as a doctor for the future and be a voice for Christ to the future doctors of the country.



Naomi also has been involved with Campus Crusade since the beginning and is probably the woman I've spent the most time investing in. Gosh, I'll miss her! She is graduating this June, as well, and is headed off to Oxford, England to work with Campus Crusade staff there to train Oxford students in being witnesses for Christ to their classmates. Naomi, like Kim, wants to be used to reach people who have little access to the gospel, so she's really excited about the large number of international students who study at Oxford.



Many people have been asking the question, "Who's going to take your place at Dartmouth once you leave?" The answer is that CCC is not assigning any new female staff here, but some of my students are taking up the charge to build into others. This term, Kim and Naomi (above), and Sarah, Annie and Melanie (three of the women at left) have all been meeting weekly to encourage one another and support one another in their mentoring of other students. They are each meeting with 2-4 younger women to help them to grow in their faith in Christ. Sarah, Annie and Mel are all juniors, so will be around next year to build into the younger students and continue to pass on what has been given to them.
