## FREE. For freedom Christ has set us free. Galatians 5:1

On New Year's Day, students descended in waves upon the Sheraton Boston Hotel, hopping out of cars and hauling their luggage up from the T station. One determined – and exhausted – student arrived after a 28-hour bus trip from Florida! No matter how tired they were, the 358 college students from all over the Northeast were riveted by the Saturday night speaker's powerful and sometimes hilarious testimony of how he came to know Christ. While Bret Ogburn described how Christ set him free from a lifestyle of parties to a life in Christ that led to him being where he is now, as senior staff with Campus Crusade for Christ, he challenged students to discover what it means to be free in Christ.

Darryl Smith's declaration Sunday morning that because of Christ we are not struggling to be free, but we are free to struggle, set the tone for a day of learning how to live out freedom in Christ. Students had two workshop sessions and were able to choose from many different workshops on being free to share their faith and being free to live in the power of the Holy Spirit. Darryl, the director for Campus Crusade's high school student ministry, Student Venture, and a speaker who returned from last year, spoke again that evening on being Free to Love. His message that was further explored by the Men's and Women's panels that night. The men and women separated into two rooms where they asked a panel of men and a panel of women questions covering every aspect of relationships, love, sex and more.

Paul Byrd, former pitcher for the Red Sox, and his wife, Kym, were on the panels and shared their struggles in dating and marriage. Paul went with students the following day during the Day of Outreach, when students fanned out across Boston to share the reason for the hope they have. God intervened as the students stepped out in faith, and 19 people prayed to receive Christ - including 2 of our own students! That night, students were excited as they shared how they had seen God at work in Boston and in their own lives.

Holly Sheldon, director of Campus Crusade's 100% Sent Initiative, challenged students not to see the day as a one-time event, but to ask how God was encouraging them to live out their lives in a way that brought the message of the Gospel to others. The workshops on Tuesday continued the idea of living as leaders and experiencing freedom. That evening Bret called on students to return to their campus with lives surrendered to Christ, a heart to serve and an eagerness to speak about the freedom found only in Christ.

The conference ended with separate campus times, where students shared what God had been doing in their lives during BWC. Hugs, tears, spontaneous worship songs, and planning sessions for more effective evangelism all broke out during that time. It was amazing to see the freedom and joy reflected in students' faces, and it will be even more incredible to see how God uses these students as they return to campus.

I knew if he could let go of his problems through Christ then I could do the same. That night I accepted Christ and I felt a whole lot better about everything. It is a journey, albeit a spiritual journey, that I have started and there is no stopping now. As the song says, "And if Our God is for us, then who could ever stop us."
