You may remember me writing last year about the huge need we have for new teams to move to New York City to reach the more than 1 million college students on 140 campuses.

One of our National Leadership Development priorities is to grow our Latino/Hispanic* student ministry. Latinos are the fastest growing ethnic minority group in our country. One in four kindergartners in the US is Latino, and half of all children born in Texas are Latino. Yet two years ago we had only 7 staff in our entire country focused on reaching this demographic. Today we have over 40 staff dedicated to reaching Latinos.

The new team in NYC is focusing on developing a Latino Student ministry. They have moved to the city for one year. Their primary goal during this time is to find Latino leaders and community people who are already living in the city who can take over and lead the Latino Student Ministry in the city.

We still have a long way to go in having enough people in the city to reach the over 1 million students, but it sure is exciting seeing this team arrive - after much prayer and many conversations. Thank you for helping us reach the next generation of leaders with the gospel.
