

I was amazed at the similarities in the stories these women shared around the campfire each night. Bright, athletic, attractive and young; yet, these students shared a common theme: deep loneliness. Some had been abandoned by parent; others had been betrayed by friends; some just were scared to let others truly know them. God had undoubtedly drawn them together for a reason, and that

became all the more clear as they bared their hearts over the course of ten days and practiced loving and trusting one another, and the Lord, in new and deeper ways.

During a hike we led a program about God's grace. Each student wrote some personal sins on rocks at the base of the mountain and then added them to their backpack for the hike up. Ugh! Eventually we stopped and asked them to share what was on their rocks. Pride, drunkenness, self-

hatred, masturbation, unforgiveness, judgment... the program became a time of confession. Then as everyone sobbed, we staff took their rocks one by one. "Colleen, I take this rock of self hatred away from you..." and with all my heart I wanted to do so. We carried their burdens the rest of the way. What love the Savior has for us. How much more aware we all were that God has removed our sins completely and reconciled us to Himself - that we should be called children of God.
