To sum up the summer, it has been about trusting God. I, Heather, took four accelerated seminary classes through Crusade's leadership school, great exercise for my long rested brain. I discovered that a lot of what I have been teaching students has become routine and I do it in my own power. Classes taught me to rely on Christ again and just totally rejuvenated my passion for Him and for His Word, refreshment I really needed.

At the same time, we had a number of meetings with Crusade's national directors about how Lifelines fit into the campus ministry structure. The meetings were discouraging; we felt misunderstood, and it seemed that our Lifelines team was the only one with any vision for outdoor ministry. Yet in His sovereignty, God was at the same time creating amazing opportunities for Lifelines. We were highlighted within CCC during the national conference, via a live interview before 6,000 staff. Next, two of our staff guys repelled into the audience and we lowered the emcees to the stage on a repel line while they wore Lifelines T-shirts and lauded Lifelines to the crowd! Miraculous! Valor, (CCC's military ministry,) Nations (Native American ministry) and Bridges (Crusades ministry to internationals) each asked us to run an expedition for their students next summer. And Ashley Denton, author of "Outdoor Christian Leadership," addressed our Lifelines staff concerning the theology of outdoor ministry and how Jesus used experiential learning as his primary teaching tool - a message we were thirsty for.

In the end, God changed the hearts of our national leaders, and we came to some accord with plans for future brainstorming together. Although we experienced much fruit this summer, God graciously humbled us in the process, reminding us that all good things are from His hand. We learned this lesson again on the long trip home when our transmission died in Indianapolis, forcing us to sell the van... and when we walked into our house in Vermont with a flooded basement.
