## Plotting the Course

As you may know, Dan and I are part of the Lifelines leadership board that oversees Lifelines on a national level. For the past six months we have been trying to determine the future of the ministry, particularly in light of what God has specifically called and gifted us to do. We have discovered that trying to do all the growth and management of a campus ministry, *and* maintain the certifications and professionalism of an outdoor ministry, *and* integrate experiential learning with spiritual growth puts us at a haggard pace without the time to truly excel in anything. So, we decided to look at what it is we do well – the part that is uniquely Lifelines - in order to use our gifts within the Body and serve to our maximum potential, glorifying God. Here it is:

- 1. Lifelines has a unique window into the lives of non-believers. By offering free outdoor trips, we are able to love and serve hundreds of lost students each semester, opening the doors to spiritual conversation and challenging misconceptions about Christ.
- 2. We effectively teach through experience. Thus, students see Biblical truths in action and practice them in a group context. The gospel is brought to life through experiential learning.

God has called Lifelines to champion experiential learning and adventure ministry. The leadership of Cru has commissioned us to be a group of specialists who will resource the Campus Ministry globally in this endeavor. In ten years there will be a Lifelines resource team in all 10 regions of the Campus Ministry. These teams will focus on what Lifelines does best: opening doors among students on campus so that campus staff can connect with the lost, and helping students and staff grow personally, professionally and spiritually. We have also been asked to train staff throughout the U.S. to use experiential learning in their ministry, and to be a resource to the Cru Leadership Development team to help staff mature in Christ-likeness and to promote healthy group functioning on staff teams.

As the world population moves to the cities, Lifelines will offer wilderness experiences where students can encounter God away from the distractions of the city, as well as taking experiential learning into the city. We are also moving toward expanding our summer expeditions and offering them throughout the year.

So, what is different in practice? We are still beginning to discover that. For one, we will spend less time trying to build a ministry on campus and more time helping other ministries thrive. We will still have a personal ministry with students, but much of that will be to practice new outdoor programs and improve our facilitating skills. Our Lifelines staff throughout the northeast will be consolidated into one or two locations from which we can serve the whole region.
