Though the schedule was grueling, alternating between class time and field experiences, and wrapping up with oral and practical exams, the staff left Guide School feeling far more equipped to take people into the back country. We intend to offer future schools for flat and white water, group facilitating, and winter practices. It is a great way to measure people's ability and to move them toward a higher level of competency as guides who use the outdoors to draw people to Christ.
