How can one person make a difference?

What do you do when you realize that pieces are missing from the puzzle you are working on? The ladies at the Women's American Baptist Convention were ready with answers after trying to complete just such a puzzle. My next question, "What are the consequences of missing pieces in a puzzle?" brought answers like, "It is purposeless, demotivating, you can't see the full picture, and it is harder to find out where the pieces you do have belong." They quickly agreed that this is the state of the church today. People are missing from the church. "Are you looking for them? What are the consequences for the rest of us? Who is going to find them?" was my challenge to the group as I spoke on Titus II. A game of "Hot potato" launched a discussion about how to invite women into the Body and build into them. These women, representing a dozen different churches, were the committed 20% who do 80% of the work. I urged them to

stop doing it all and to just focus on reproducing. "It is good to knit socks for prisoners, but how much better if you were teaching a younger woman to knit socks for prisoners?" Please pray as they take these ideas back to the church that God will use them to "train up younger women in the way they should go."
