Canoeing the Croix

For Dan and I, one of our greatest joys is leading Thrive trips together. With Dan's achilles' surgery and so many men's or women's events, we have not had much of an opportunity for that until July when we led a four day canoe trip for families. "Prioritizing What Matters" was the theme. Christian leaders tell us that God, family, and work should be prioritized in that order, but we struggle to live by that sequence. This was a chance to get away into the wilderness, unplug, and practice those priorities of intentionally connecting with God, spouse, and kids. It was not easy- anyone who canoes with a partner for the first time or battles 80 degree nights in a tent can attest to thatintentionally carving out time for God and working through conflict and fatigue with your kids is never easy. But, it is worth it. Just going into the wilderness as a family to focus on one another speaks volumes in terms of your commitment to each other, and the shared experiences alone are unifying. Over 50 miles and 20 caught fish, nightly campfire games, two waterfalls, 1,000 mosquitoes, and gorgeous sunsets... like life, there was good and bad. Half the kids wanted to add more days to the trip and one wanted to stop the first day. What a reflection of real life and what a perfect training ground! How do we trust in God when it is hard? How do we come to group decisions and allow everyone to be heard? How do we believe the best in each other? These were just a few of the issues we addressed. And that post trip dinner and ice cream never tasted so good. Would they do it again? Yes! Come with us next year!

Desperate Prayers. Divine God.

Tragedy. Fear. Hope. Rejoicing. This month has been a whirlwind for our team, and particularly for our new staff family, the Ketters. Shawna was admitted to the hospital on July 17th to induce labor three weeks early. Five days later, swollen with preeclampsia, a healthy baby girl was delivered by C-section. The four older Ketter kids had been living with us since Shawna was admitted and we had no sooner dropped them off to see the baby than I got a call from Elliana, the oldest at fifteen, asking me to pray because Shawna and Craig had gone to the ICU. They were alone in the room with their new sister. Dan and I raced back to the hospital for one of the most harrowing experiences as Shawna descended into volume shock from uncontrolled internal bleeding. In the fight of her life, she was intubated, ventilated and Life-Flighted to Bangor. There she immediately underwent a six-hour surgery, the first of three over the next week. She went into cardiac arrest during the surgery as surgeons struggled to control bleeding and everything was complicated by the preeclampsia. But praise God who hears our prayers, she has survived! She spent a month in the hospital, coming home *this week*. Yesterday she was readmitted for an infection that is causing intense pain and high fevers. Please pray for Shawna and for Craig and the kids in this ongoing fight. Fortunately, Shawna's mom flew and the kids have taken amazing care of the baby.
