Our Lifelines national leadership team consists of nine people. This month we met for a week in South Carolina to discuss and plan the direction of the ministry. One of our biggest challenges is making our concepts easily transferrable for new staff wanting to join Lifelines. We are working to make our training and materials unified and accessible in order to manage the growth of lifelines across the nation. Currently Lifelines is on six campuses, with about 35 staff. We are also offering a summer project and two ten-day expeditions for students nationwide this summer. At the end of July we will host a twoday "Lifelines base camp" for all of our staff as a time of aligning and vision casting.
