

Jan 2-6, 2012 280 Student Attendees 68 Campuses 6 Students Accepted Christ

We all have 'epicenter' moments in our lives--those defining moments that change everything," Bret Ogburn, National Director of Campus Field Ministry, told over 350 students and staff gathered in Albany for the first night of the Epicenter Experience. "But the greatest singular important moment in human history--the 'epicenter' above all--was the birth, death, and resurrection of Jesus Christ." The tone for the four-day conference was set as Bret went on to clearly present the gospel and challenge students to consider what other than Christ they might be keeping at the center of their lives.

Students representing 68 different New York and New England college campuses made their way to Albany at the beginning of January for the Epicenter Experience, a brand new Cru winter conference for the Northeast Region. The new conference included many elements similar to those of its forerunner, the Boston Winter Conference: powerful worship by a student-led band, challenging and gospel-centered messages delivered by talented speakers, time for students to learn and practice sharing their faith with others, and space to consider further opportunities to serve the Lord both stateside and overseas.

However, the first Epicenter Experience also brought with it many new advantages: a location more central to the Northeast region (Albany, NY), a centralized hotel/meeting space that allowed for more inter-campus fun and relationship-building, and a name symbolic to the central significance of Christ in the world and our lives--as well to the ways the Northeast is in itself an "epicenter" whose influence is felt around the globe.

A highlight of the week was the region's first ever "Digital Day of Outreach". Students learned how to share their personal story of how Christ entered and changed their life, and were given the opportunity to record their stories on video. They were then challenged to post their testimony to their Facebook profile, to email it to friends, or to find other creative ways to use media and technology to spark spiritual conversations with others. The digital storytelling was a success, with over forty students recording their stories on video and over 1,000 views of the online student testimonies to date.

At the main sessions, staff members Bret Ogburn, Greg Lillestrand, and Charmaine Lillestrand spoke on God's heart for the world and surrendering our lives to Him. Other highlights of the week included seminars on more specific topics such as godly relationships and the Holy Spirit, open times of sharing within campus groups, and space to connect with God in a fresh way at the multi-sensory Prayer Journey.

The final evening of the conference, Bret shared the story of Jonah and asked students to consider what "Nineveh" God might be calling them to bring His love and message to. He then invited them to come and write their "Nineveh" on a giant wall at the side of the room. The wall was soon completely filled with students' covenants to follow God's leading (see picture at bottom right).

It was incredible to witness the ways God brought the Epicenter Experience together and worked in the lives of the students present. At least six students accepted Christ for the first time while at Epicenter, and dozens more left the conference with a renewed desire to keep Christ at the center and impact their campuses and communities for Him.
