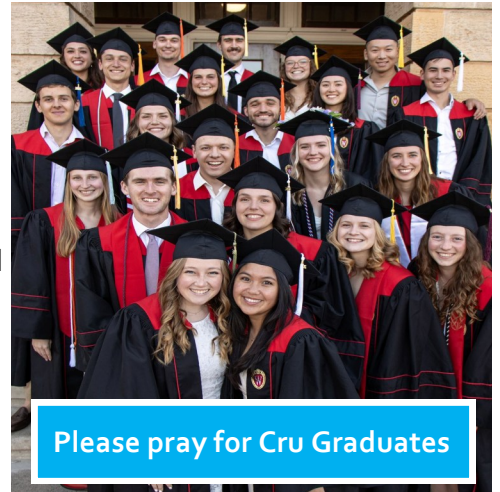


Dear Partners,

We also spent time thinking about eternity and how our lives here on earth can affect it. Although no decision was made there, we committed to doing the work with God. We committed to asking the scary questions of "how does my life best fit into God's will?" and praying the scary prayers of "God, may we be men who take risks for you" and "may serving you be the most important part of our lives."*

So why Thailand? College campuses are among the most strategic and open environments to share the gospel. Thailand is a predominantly Buddhist country, and many students have never heard the name of Jesus, let alone the full story of His love and grace. Often bringing the gospel to Thailand involves sharing with students for the very first time. Along with the students' spiritual needs, the team there now has a need for more male leaders. One of the campuses we will be serving on is an engineering campus, which has a predominantly male student body. An engineering campus in Thailand could provide some overlap in the lives of the Thai students.



Many students are in a season of life where they're asking big questions about identity, purpose and truth. The same thing happens here in the states where students want to figure out what they want the rest of their lives to look like. They're shaping their worldview and making decisions that will influence the rest of their lives. That means the seeds of the gospel planted now can have an incredible lifelong impact.

Thai culture deeply values relationships and hospitality. When you invest in authentic friendships, there's real openness to spiritual conversations. Thai students are curious, kind and often eager to practice their English, so even casual conversations can become divine opportunities. Since campuses bring students together from across the country, reaching one or two universities can have a ripple effect across Thailand.

We put aside all our own worldly goals for a summer, a year or a long while and accepted God's call to the Sent Christian life. It's been said before, WE'RE BADGERS and WE GO! Let's bring that back!
