Out of the 200 students, including an all time high of 80 freshmen who joined us this year, six more freshmen had stood to proclaim a decision to come to Christ.

He had already made plans to join a number of other students later that night for a "Date night with Jesus," where students set aside a couple hours to create quiet space to read the Bible, pray, journal and in other ways spend time with God.

The culture on campus can be very challenging, especially for a new believer who may have been living a lifestyle with other friends that can be hard to break.
