Three years ago I (Emily) was put in charge of leading an Action Group (a Bible study for leaders within the ministry). I was in my senior year of college. I didn't know any of the young women in my group, and they didn't know me. I was tasked not only with teaching them from the Bible, but to build a community for them, encourage them in their ministries and equip them to



be active in sharing their faith, now and in the future. The first few weeks were awkward, forced, and uncomfortable. The girls didn't like each other very much, and I they didn't seem to like me. I distinctly remember thinking, "Lord, this is impossible."

As the year wore on, I learned. They grew together. They seemed to like me more. Suddenly, I saw change happening! Even so, it felt difficult. I cried myself to sleep many nights, aching over the complexity and challenges of leading so many different women well. Now, three years later, they are graduating. They are honored leaders on campus and in our ministry. Three of them have committed to full-time missions for the next year. All of them are committed to serving Jesus wherever He takes them. Taylor was right - every great work of God follows this trajectory. Right now,

we are feeling weighed down by the intense difficulty of finding people and churches to partner with us in our ministry so that we can return to campus. Soon, that will be done. And then we will face the impossibility of being on campus - meeting new students, starting new Bible studies, leading new ministries. That will turn into the difficulty of sustaining and enduring in ministry for the long-haul. One day, eventually, even that will be done.

Impossible. Difficult. Done.

God works, even while we struggle and sigh under the weight of the tasks He has called us to. We pray that you, too, cling to God through the impossible and difficult. Look to Him, and don't look back. In the confusion, the doubt, and the struggle, remember that this, too, will one day be done. Today, it feels impossible, and tomorrow it will feel difficult, but one day it will be done. And I'm convinced the joy that we'll feel on that day will be worth every moment of impossible and difficult.
