July 14th - I was in the middle of practicing my talk on Mark 4:35-41 when my phone rang. Caller ID showed it was my mom, so I put my notes down and answered the call. On the other end, I heard her say, "Grandma's gone."

My Grandma (my Dad's mom) had been ill with terminal cancer for a few months, but none of us expected her to go so soon or so quickly. It was shocking and jarring. I got some details for the funeral, said I love you, and then hung up the phone. I sat staring at my notes for some time, unable to process all the thoughts and emotions that were in my head.

We'll have to buy flights to get out there and back - that will be expensive. How will we finish our classes? How did this happen so quickly? I didn't get to say goodbye. We can't afford a last minute hotel. I wish I had called her yesterday. I'm so glad I went up to see her before we left for Colorado. Do I even have a black dress with us?
The thoughts kept coming in a flood.



In the end, I decided to finish practicing my talk before I did anything else. It only seemed fitting in light of the howling storm that had seemed to very suddenly whip up around me, just as it had whipped up around the disciples, leaving them terrified and wondering if Jesus even cared about them at all. I'd like to share just a short excerpt of that talk that I wrote (and then gave in a hurry before jumping on a plane to try to make it back to Michigan in time for the wake), as it has given me both insight and comfort in these days.

"We often think the correct response to a lack of faith is "try harder." Muster up some faith! I think if we were asked to rewrite this passage, many of us think the disciples' correct response should have been to swallow their fear and sit down quietly while their boat sank. NO! That's a terrible story. I think what we see later in the book of Mark shows us what Jesus desires. In Mark 9, we see the story of a man who comes to Jesus to ask him to heal his dying daughter. However, the way he phrases his request shows that he doesn't actually believe Jesus will do anything for him. Jesus rebukes him for this, and the man's response - it's so beautiful - he falls to his knees and cries out "I believe, help my unbelief!" That's what Jesus wants. He wanted the disciples to come to him and say, 'Jesus, we're terrified! We don't understand you or this storm, or anything else. But we want to trust you. We want to have the calm you have right now. Will you help us?'"
