Our team experienced many surprises, and loads of God's grace. A great example is the countless times we were taken care of by our Salvadorian friends; everything from making sure we knew how to get places to helping us decode the Evanjelica and Matias campuses. I will always be marked by their endless willingness to extend hospitality and a heart-felt welcome. It is unfortunate that most Americans associate violence with El Salvador because of the gang problem, when the majority of the people are so beautiful. I have seen how Salvadorian culture reflects parts of God's character - gentle, patient, and observant. Their quality of life is staked upon relationships, not accomplishment, which is reflected in the slower pace of life. As I return to the states, the hardest transition is embracing the truth that my relationship with Christ is most precious, not my performance for God. I'm realizing that I have much to still learn from my time in El Salvador. Please pray that God grants me, and the rest of the team, the grace to unpack everything that we learned in those short six weeks. But this may not be the end of my involvement with El Salvador. My team leader, Jamey, has asked me to help with coaching our STINT team in El Salvador, which means I would be going back for a week sometime this year. When most people hear that I went on a mission trip to Central America, they ask if we were building houses or working at an orphanage. Well, we were doing a ministry that is rarely done in other countries. Monday through Thursday our team spent the mornings on one of two university campuses, Evanjelica or Matias. We were there to share our faith, disciple believers, and help lead Bible studies. Our hope and prayer is that from our labor we would see future leaders impacted with the good news of Jesus, thus impacting the entire country for decades to come. But we added one twist to our five weeks of campus ministry. We decided to pair our American students with a Salvadorian student who was already involved with Vida Estudiantil (what Cru is called in most Latin American countries). As our time concluded, we found this was our best decision all summer. Because the culture is so relational, many Salvadorian students told us they felt incredibly loved and cared for by their American friends. Also, they were more motivated to pour out their lives into their classmates because we didn't give them tasks, but showed them how authentic relationships can deeply impact people. Oh, how I pray that this movement would grow in Christ-likeness by living God's relational heart to see men and women redeemed back into relationship with the Father.
